INTRODUCTION



Kulea Watoto is a 3 year project funded by the **Conrad N.Hilton Foundation**. The project provides nurturing care, early childhood learning opportunities, and support to target clients to build skills in generating income for their families. Kulea Watoto uses a unique two-generation integrated approach to reach children under five years of age and their caregivers in the districts of Yumbe, Kyegegwa and Kampala.

The projects' main objective is to improve access to quality early childhood development for children aged five years and under and transform livelihoods opportunities for refugees and host communities in Uganda.

Specifically, the project aims to:

- Empower households with responsive caregiving and early learning skills.
- Improve economic well-being and household income generation opportunities.
- Improve the availability of quality Early Childhood Development (ECD) services.
- Advocate for an enabling environment for quality ECD service provision.





NURTURING CHILDREN



Rose Poni, Refugee from South Sudan and stall owner in Yumbe District in west Nile, Uganda. Kulea Watoto trained Rose on financial literacy and offered her a cash grant. From the cash grant, she opened up food stall and a tailoring shop. These two businesses have supported her with an income that is helping her take care of her young child.



John Byamungu, refugee from DR Congo and Chairman Center Management Committee at Lucky Early Childhood Development Center, Kyaka II Refugee Settlement, Kyegegwa District, Uganda. Kulea Watoto provided seed grants to ECD centers to start income generating projects that will ensure sustainability of the learning centers.

My community did not have a nursery school, so I freely offered my land to establish the home learning center for our children to have nursery education. I am grateful that Kulea Watoto supported us to start and also train our caregivers to give the best education for our children.



Kassim Juma, Landlord and Chairman Center Management Committee, Mungufeni Home Learning Center, Yumbe District, west Nile, Uganda. With the nearest nursery school over 50KMs away, Kassim freely offered his land for Kulea Watoto and the community to set up a home learning center that is currently supporting 324 children to access early learning in his village.



Francis Banda, refugee from South Sudan and entrepreneur molding chalk known by the trademark, Extra Success Chalk in Makindye, Kampala City, Uganda. Francis started a chalk business including buying a molding machine that produces over 400 pieces in a single round. With this business, he is supporting fellow youths with gainful employment.



Fredrick Nsegiyumba, refugee from DR Congo and Kulea Watoto Champion, Kyaka II Refugee Settlement, Kyegegwa District, Uganda. A network of Kulea Watoto Champions are voluntarily sensitizing their communities to prioritize early eaducation, and nutritious feeding for the children under 06 years.

Estella Munezero, restaurant owner and refugee from Burundi at Bakuli, Kampala, Uganda. Estella was stuck at home without a job or any source of income. She was later identified under the Kulea Watoto project equipped with business skills and later supported with a cash grant which she used to start up a restaurant in Kampala.

Kulea Watoto taught us the benefits of working together as husband and wife to ensure a happy family. In my community now, cases of married people fighting have reduced because men and women are working together in their gardens to feed their families.



Phillip Ochan and wife Betty Ngonga farmers and refugees from South Sudan, Yumbe District, west Nile, Uganda. Betty and Phillip plant both cash and food crops that support to not only provide an income for their son's school fees but also for nutritious food for him and their family.

Lawrence Renco Kasirye, national and signage artist from Kampala City, Uganda. Lawrence, a father of five had no source of income. Many financial institutions were hesitant to lend to him for fear that he would default. Kulea Watoto provided him with a cash grant that enabled him to start a signage business from which he now derives an income to support his children.

Asna Gadai, refugee from South Sudan and parent at Limika Home Learning Center, Yumbe District, west Nile, Uganda. Realizing that the nearest Early Learning Center was over 45km away, Kulea Watoto supported Asna's community in Limika to set up a learning center where children would attend.





Kulea Watoto has trained young parents like Cynthia on the benefits of providing nutritious meals for their children, and ensuring they are taken to an early learning center at the age of three years.



Eriab Mupenda, learner at the Lucky Early Childhood Development Center, Kyaka II Refugee Settlement, Kyegegwa District, Uganda. Eriab comes from one of the Kulea Watoto supported households. His parents are happy that he is in school and learning with children of his age.

Mutoni Redempta, a refugee from the DR Congo and a baker in Kampala City, Uganda. Redempta was skilled in baking by Kulea Watoto at the Bakery, Skilling and Business Incubation Common User Facility. With these skills and a cash grant from the project she bought an oven and currently bakes several products that she sells to earn an income to support young children's education and basic needs at home.



Jafar Omondi, National and Leader of a farmers group in Yumbe, west Nile, Uganda. Kulea Watoto continues to support farmer groups in Yumbe with farm tools such as hoes, rakes, seeds etc. and agronomy skills that have enabled them improve their harvests. From the sales of their harvests, they are able to provide for their families and most importantly can afford early education for their children.education.



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
